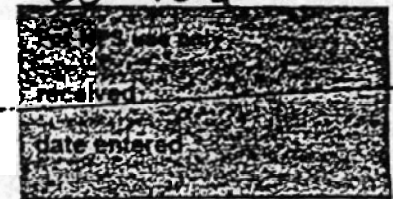

Physical Description

A striking simplicity pervades the design of this city residence situated on a wide, level lot on Arch Street in Little Rock. The stucco, two-story, three-bay house with symmetrical facade was designed by Thompson and Harding in 1919. Echoes of both the Mediterranean and the Colonial Revival styles commingle in the composition of the simple, squarish block of the house which is crowned by a green terra-cotta hipped roof. Decorative details are limited to the porch which features four slender, fluted Doric columns supporting a full entablature with plain frieze. Outlining the top of the porch is a wrought iron railing in a simple rectilinear design. The front door features a multi-paned window in its upper portion and has multi-paned sidelights as well. Other windows in the house are eight-over-eight light sash windows. Accentuating the overall horizontal emphasis of the design is the wide, slightly raised yellow brick terrace which forms the visual base for the house; from this base a wide brick sidewalk extends down three shallow steps to sidewalk level.

Statement of Significance

The house designed for Charles Frauenthal by the Thompson and Harding firm in 1919 is located in the historic Arch Street residential neighborhood. Although the basic design represents a relatively common approach by the firm to the two-story residence, i.e., a cube-like mass with three bays and a hipped roof, here the combination of smooth stucco surfaces and simple Colonial Revival ornament and a fine sense of proportion create a quietly elegant statement in a streetscape featuring a wide variety of house styles. This house is clearly one of the most significant and successful variations of this type in the collection.
